
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Non-Heroin Opiate use in South Dakota and United States Increase

Treatment Episode Data Sets (TEDS) report on substance abuse admissions and discharges. Non-heroin opiates include codeine, hydrocodone, hydromorphone, meperidine, morphine, opium, oxycodone, pentazocine, propoxyphene, tramadol, and any other drug with morphine like effects - not including non-prescription methadone.

Between 2001 and 2011, admissions increased steadily from 28 to 387 incidents. Although the rate relative to population has been less than the corresponding national rate, both the US and SD rates have greatly outpaced population growth. The rate of admissions from South Dakota residents has increased from 4 per 100,000 to 56 per 100,000.
